

**U.S. ASSAILED IN U.N.  
ON RHODESIA ISSUE**

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.,  
Nov. 12—Representatives of  
developing countries condemned  
the United States today for its  
plans to import chrome from  
Rhodesia in the face of United  
Nations trade sanctions against  
her.

An American source said that  
the United States would be  
breaking the Security Council  
sanctions and that Congress  
had the power to do so if Presi-  
dent Nixon did not veto the bill.

If it becomes law, its oppo-  
nents said, the bill will cancel  
the President's authority to en-  
force the Security Council's  
sanctions.

The United States has bought  
chrome from Rhodesia since the  
sanctions went into effect

against the white-dominated  
former British colony in 1965.  
But those shipments, according  
to American sources, were based  
on a Union Carbide Corpora-  
tion contract signed before  
sanctions took effect. The new  
move would be for freshly  
negotiated sales in open defi-  
ance of the sanctions.

The Assembly committee deal-  
ing with colonial questions  
passed a resolution of censure  
yesterday against the United  
States by a vote of 93 to 2,  
with 12 abstentions.
