New Check on Rehnquist D

WASHINGTON — (UPI) — to ask the FBI to look further nominee William H. Rehnquist succeeded today in delaying until Tuseday action by the Senate Judiciary Committee on his appointment, pending further FBI investi-gation of the Arizonan's background.

The committee voted 10 to 5 against reopening hearings on the Rehnquist nomination, by 10-5 vot but Chairman James O. Eastland (D-Miss.) agreed full Senate.
