### URGE TIES WITH CUBA

(Reuters) — Twelve Republican Congressmen urged President Nixon and Congress today to take immediate steps for normal United States relations with Cuba, broken off on Jan. 3, 1961.

The Representatives proposed at a news conference that the President make every effort to reach an agreement with Cuba against airliner hijacking and use talks on that subject as a starting point for discussion of other issues.

They urged Mr. Nixon to support a Peruvian proposal, made before the Organization of American States, that would permit any country in the organization to resume normal relations with Cuba. The Congressmen recommended further

that the House Foreign Affairs Committee and the Senate Foreign Relations Committee hold hearings on United States policy toward Cuba.
