Congress Is Urged to Study  
U.S. Vietnam Involvement

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7, (AP)  
— Senator Robert Dole, a former Republican national chairman, called today for a Congressional investigation of the causes and origins of United States involvement in Vietnam.

The Kansas Republican specified in his resolution that the study cover United States actions back to 1945. In a statement he cited the growth of United States advisers and the killing of former President Ngo Dinh Diem during the Democratic Administration of the late President John F. Kennedy.

Mr. Dole proposed a 14-member committee composed equally of Senate and House members, four Democrats and three Republicans from each, saying that sort of panel "will provide the fairest, most impartial means of providing answers we must have."
