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Nixon Fills 2 Spots in State Dept.

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President Nixon has nominated industrialist Robert S. Ingersoll to be deputy secretary of state in one of two moves to fill key vacancies at the State Department.

Mr. Nixon also said yesterday that he will nominate Carlyle E. Maw, now the department's legal adviser, as undersecretary for security assistance, press spokesman Ronald Ziegler said.

Ingersoll, a former ambassador to Japan, currently is assistant secretary of state for East Asian and Pacific affairs. He succeeds Kenneth Rush, who left the department's No. 2 position to become Mr. Nixon's chief economic policy coordinator.

Both nominations are subject to Senate confirmation.

Maw will replace William Donaldson, a New York investment banker who resigned last month, reportedly because of dissatisfaction over his relationship with Secretary of State Henry Kissinger.

The nominations still leave one of the six top positions in the department vacant, that of undersecretary for economic affairs. That position was vacated early this year when William Casey was named head of the Export-Import Bank.

Ingersoll, 60, is from Winnetka, Ill. Before his appointment as ambassador to Japan in 1972, he was chairman of the board of Borg-Warner Corp. He was named assistant secretary in 1973.

Maw is a New York lawyer who handled some personal affairs for Kissinger in the 1960s. He has traveled with Kissinger during the secretary's recent trips abroad.
