

**NOSENKO CALLED SON  
OF LATE SOVIET AIDE**

 MOSCOW, Feb. 26—Usually reliable sources said Wednesday that Yuri I. Nosenko, the Soviet disarmament delegation member who defected to the United States early this month, was a son of Ivan I. Nosenko, Minister of Shipbuilding until he died in 1956.

The younger Nosenko disappeared in Geneva Feb. 4. Ten days later the State Department announced that the United States would grant political asylum to the 36-year-old official, whom it described as a member of the Soviet secret police.

The Shipbuilding Minister, who was named an alternate member of the Communist party's policy-making Central Committee in 1952, was buried with honors in the Kremlin wall. He apparently played a key role in managing Soviet industry in World War II and headed the Transport Machinery and Shipbuilding Ministries through a series of reorganizations in the postwar period. A shipyard was named for him in the Black Sea port of Kherson.
