2 CAPITAL NEWSMEN WIN HILLMAN PRIZES

Carl Bernstein and Bob Woodward, investigative reporters for The Washington Post, have named recipients of the 23d annual Sidney Hillman awards for their coverage of the Watergate affair.

Four other persons also have been named to receive the awards, named for the first president of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America. The awards, consisting of scrolls and checks of \$500 to each of the winners, will be presented today at a luncheon at the Commodore Hotel.

Lucy Jarvis, a television producer, was cited for her National Broadcasting Company documentary "What Price Health," an examination of soaring health costs and the plight of the poor.

Frances Fitzgerald will be honored for her best-selling book "Fire In the Lake," on Vietnam.

Frank J. Donner and Eugene Cerruti, lawyers who have collaborated on several writing projects, will receive awards for their article in The Nation, "The Grand Jury Network," on the use of grand juries to curb dissent.
