

L.A. Judge Subpoenas Egil Krogh

A Superior Court judge ordered the subpoena of former White House aide Egil Krogh yesterday, signing the document which asks that Krogh testify at a county grand jury probe of the break-in at the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

Superior Court Judge James Kolts signed the subpoena at the request of District Attorney Joseph Busch, who had filed a statement saying Krogh's testimony was needed "to prove the extent of the conspiracy" behind the break-in and to establish who all participants were.

Busch's spokesman said a deputy would take the subpoena to Washington within the next two days to insure that it is acted upon promptly.

The deputy is also expected to take with him a subpoena for David Young, a former National Security Council employee.

That subpoena will be taken to court for approval today.

Krogh and Young were named by former presidential adviser John D. Ehrlichman as the men who headed the White House special investigative unit said to have planned the break-in. The unit was known as "the plumbers" because it tried to plug leaks of classified information such as the Pentagon papers.

Although Ehrlichman denied knowing about the 1971 break-in until after it occurred, the Washington Star-News reported yesterday that Young, in an appearance before a federal grand jury in Washington, had testified that Ehrlichman approved the burglary in advance. *Associated Press*
