## Views on Nixon Involvement Little Changed by Hearings

By George Gallup PRINCETON, N.J. — After seven weeks of the Senate hearings, the views of the American people regarding Watergate can be summed up as follows:

1. A large majority of Americans (3 of 4 in the latest survey) continue to believe President Nixon was involved, at least to some degree, in Watergate. Views on Mr. Nixon's involvement have changed very little in three national surveys over the last six weeks. The latest survey was conducted following testimony by John W. Dean III at the Senate hearings but before former Attorney General John N. Mitchell took the stand.

2. The public is divided about evenly between those who believe Watergate is a "very serious matter," revealing corruption in the Nixon administration, and those who dismiss Water-

gate as "just politics—the kind of thing in which both parties engage." Again, views have changed little in the last three surveys.

3. A slightly increased number of Americans—24 per cent in the latest survey compared to 18 per cent in a late June survey—think President Nixon should be impeached and removed from the presidency.

A cross-section was asked: Should President Nixon be compelled to leave office?
