GOP national chairman George Bush charged yesterday that Carmine S. Bellino, chief investigator for the Senate Watergate committee, may have directed a spy campaign against Republicans in 1960.

Bush released three affidavits, including one from a man who died last week but who had sworn under oath that he was confident that a spy team had bugged the hotel room of the then Vice President Richard M. Nixon shortly before his nationally televised debates with Senator John F. Kennedy.

Bellino said he worked for Mr. Kennedy in 1960 but not to gather intelligence. He said the charges were "totally false . . . they're really scraping the bottom of the

Bush refused to say if he believes the allegations and said he couldn't personally vouch for the accuracy of the affidavits.

He said he informed the Senate Watergate committee of his information last week and was reserving the right to use it as he saw fit.

The affidavits are from Joseph Shimon, a private investigator in Washington for the last decade and a former policeman here; from John W. Leon, a veteran of 15 years as an investigator before his death last week, and Edward Murray Jones — now in the Philippines — who worked for Bellino in the Kennedy campaign for 1960.

Bellino is serving as the Senate committee's on financial matters, tracing the cash funds that appear over and over in the case.

For years he served in a similar capacity for the Sen-a te Permanent Investigations subcommittee.

Bellino is a former FBI agent and an acknowledged expert in accounting and financial investigations.

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
