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# Seen in Plot On Nixon

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The Secret Service said yesterday it was continuing an investigation of a possible plot to assassinate President Nixon but declined to furnish any details.

A spokesman said the investigation may take some time, and that the President's route because of the threat to his life.

While many people were angry for the Secret Service's decision to cancel the parade, the Secret Service said that cancellation was necessary for its own protection.

Some people in New Orleans were quoted as saying the Secret Service was overreacting.
