Nixon Backed On Watergate In the Courts

Although President Nixon's credibility on Watergate has been seriously damaged and many doubts about his role in the cover-up remain despite his recent televised answer to critics; by a substantial 62 to 32 per cent a majority agree with Mr. Nixon that "it is time to turn the whole question of Watergate over to the courts and allow the President to concentrate on more important things."

When asked if the Senate Committee on Watergate should continue its hearings on "campaign dirty tricks" in September by only a 51 to 45 per cent margin did a majority think the hearings should go forward. By 51 to 44 per cent, however, again a slim majority, most people oppose carrying the hearings on television.

By a decisive 59 to 33 per cent margin, a majority still give the committee high marks on the hearings held to date. But the number who are negative has risen steadily from 20 per cent in May to 29 per cent in July to 33 per cent in this latest Harris Survey.

The committee still has a powerful voice in the con-clusions it might reach on the question of whether or not President Nixon knew about the cover-up. On this question, the cross section of 1,536 households were asked in person on Aug. 18

and 19: ""If the Senate Watergate Committee decides that President Nixon was involved in the Watergate cover-up, do you think Congress should impeach him or not?"
