BALTIMORE, Jan. 3 (AP)-U.S. Attorney George Beall says the public "could be justifiably disappointed" if former Vice President Spiro T. Agnew is not disbarred.

"The public expects disbarment," said Beall, who headed the federal probe that led to Agnew's no-contest plea to a tax charge and resignation from the vice presidency.
