Notes on People*Million for Watergate Paperback*

Carl Bernstein and Bob Woodward, The Washington Post investigative reporters, have sold paperback rights of their book about Watergate, "All the President's Men," for \$1-million. Their share in the sale is about half the full amount, with their hardcover publisher, Simon and Shuster, receiving an equal share.

The sale, to Warner Paperback Library, is a record-setter, in financial terms, for a book that has not yet appeared in hardcover. Other books have garnered \$1-million for paperback rights, but they were already runaway best-sellers when the deals were struck. The Bernstein, Woodward edition will not appear until June 18.

Sources in the publishing industry said yesterday that Mr. Bernstein and Mr. Woodward would probably each realize \$1-million from their book. They have sold movie rights for \$450,000, most of which will go to them; the book is a full selection of the Book-of-the-Month Club, and Playboy magazine is publishing two excerpts from the book, for which the authors received a \$60,000 advance against royalties from Simon and Shuster.
