## Maheu Tells of Delayina Article On a Donald Nixon Hughes Loan

LOS ANGELES, May 15—Robert A. Maheu described to-day how he had tried unsuccessfully to prevent details of the "Hughes-Nixon Ioan" from being publicized before the 1960 Presidential election and said he had rebuffed a suggestion from Howard R. Hughes that some relationship be established between the Hughes Tool Company and the Central Intelligence Agency Mr. Hughes's most important managers, but they split in 1970. Mr. Hughes later asserted in a news conference that Mr. Maheu sued in Federal District Court here for \$17.3-million in defamation damages, and his statements today were part of his testimony in their Newspaper Article

Speeds, "I finally told him," he said, "[that] it was necessary for me to be in Miami because I was involved in a very sensitive assignment for an intelligence agency of the Government."

Mr. Maheu said it was the Central Intelligence Agency, but he did not describe the assignment.

His testified that in 1968, when Mr. Hughes and he were discussing the poor relation-ships between the Hughes companies and some Federal agencies, "Mr. Hughes asked me if I would try to make some kind of arrangement with the C.I.A. whereby some part of the Hughes Tool Company woul become a front for the intelligence agency."

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Mr. Maheu said that "we were successful in delaying the story until after the election," but that the arrangement was destroyed when Richard M. Nixon and his campaign advisers decided to leak the story to a friendly columnist, Peter Edson.

Mr. Maheu said the column appeared 'with many misstatements in it' and that the late Drew Pearson, who also had withheld publication of a column about the dealing, then decided to tell what he knew of the loan.
