Senator Talmadge said that the brothers, F. Donald Nixon and Edward C. Nixon, had failed to appear at a second scheduled session today. The panel is investigating \$100,000 that Howard R. Huges, the integral dustrialist, gave to Charles G. Rebozo, the President's close

friend.

The committee has reportedly received testimony by Herbert V. Kalmach, the President's former personal attorney, linking the Nixon brothers to the Hughes gift. Sources said that Mr. Kalmbach testified he had been told by Mr. Rebozo that gifts and loans were made from the Hughes money to the Nixon brothers and to Rose Mary Woods, the President's personal secretary.

Mr. Rebozo, according to sources, has denied making such payments and has insisted that he returned the money intact to Mr. Hughes legt year.
