## Dubious Judgment

"In these transcripts, portions not relevant . . . with regard to Watergate are not included, but everything that is relevant is included . . . . I have spent many hours of my own time personally reviewing these materials and personally deciding questions of relevancy."

President Nixon, April 29, 1974

Among Mr. Nixon's deletions:

- President: John Dean . . . put the fires out, almost got the damn thing nailed down till past the election and so forth. We all know what it was. . . .
- President: I want you all to stonewall it, let them plead the Fifth Amendment, cover-up or anything else, if it'll save it—save the plan. That's the whole point. . . . Up to this point the whole theory has been containment, as you know, John.

Mitchell: Yeah.
