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**Ehrlichman Becomes No. 22 on List of Guilty**

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Friday's conviction of John D. Ehrlichman raises to 22 the number of pleas or verdicts of guilty in Watergate-related cases against persons who served in the Nixon administration or who were connected with the campaign to re-elect the President.

Two others were acquitted.

A U.S. District Court jury convicted Ehrlichman, who for three years was President Nixon's top domestic adviser, of four criminal charges arising from the break-in at the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist. Sentencing has been set for July 31.

A capsule listing of the other cases follows in groupings, starting with the break-in at the office of the psychiatrist, Dr. Lewis Fielding:

Egil Krogh Jr., former aide to Ehrlichman; pleaded guilty; was sentenced to serve six months of term of two to six years; has been released after serving term of 4½ months, with time off for good behavior.

Charles W. Colson, former White House special counsel; pleaded guilty; sentenced to one to three years and fined \$5,000.

G. Gordon Liddy, former White House aide, Bernard L. Barker and Eugenio Martinez; all convicted; to be sentenced July 31.

Watergate cover-up:

Frederick C. LaRue, an aide to John N. Mitchell when the former Attorney General headed the Committee for the Re-election of the President; pleaded guilty; sentencing deferred.

Job Stuart Magruder, former deputy director of the committee, pleaded guilty; now serving sentence of 10 months to four years.

John W. Dean III, former White House counsel; pleaded guilty; sentencing deferred.

Herbert L. Porter, the committee's scheduling director; pleaded guilty; sentenced to serve 30 days of a sentence of five to 45 months; served April 22 to May 17.

Watergate burglary:  
E. Howard Hunt Jr. pleaded guilty; served 10 months and five days of a sentence of 2½ to eight years and was fined \$10,000.

James M. McCord Jr.; convicted; appealing sentence of one to five years.

Virgilio Gonzalez and Martinez; pleaded guilty; sentenced to one to four years Nov. 9; paroled March 7.

Frank A. Sturgis, pleaded guilty and was given same sentence as Gonzalez and Martinez but was freed Jan. 18 by court order pending appeal.

Barker, sentenced to 2½ to six years on his plea of guilty, was released pending appeal, on Jan. 4, after serving one year, 19 days.

Liddy; convicted; sentenced to term of six years and eight months to 20 years and fined \$40,000; in D.C. jail since March 23, 1973.

International Telephone and Telegraph:

Former Attorney General Richard G. Kleindienst, pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge of refusing to testify; sentenced to one month of unsupervised probation and to pay \$100 fine; sentence was suspended.

Robert L. Vesco, the fugitive financier:

Former re-election committee finance chairman and Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans; acquitted.

Mitchell; acquitted.  
"Dirty Tricks:"

Dwight L. Chapin, Mr. Nixon's former appointments secretary; convicted; sentenced to 10 to 30 months, but free pending appeal.

Donald H. Segretti; pleaded guilty; sentenced to six months; served 4½ months.

George A. Hearing; pleaded guilty; sentenced to one year; served 9¼ months.

Illegal campaign contributions:

Herbert W. Kalmbach, the President's personal lawyer; pleaded guilty; sentenced to six to eighteen months and a \$10,000 fine, plus a concurrent six-month sentence; began serving sentence July 1.

Several White House and re-election campaign figures in these and other Watergate-related cases are awaiting trial.

Indictments have been dismissed against some, and others have been granted immunity to testify.

The foregoing listing omits corporations and corporate officers convicted of making illegal campaign contributions.
