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**Ervin Panel Urges
A 'Public Attorney'
In Its Final Report**

WASHINGTON, July 12 (UPI)—The Senate Watergate committee formally went out of business today, and its chairman said the committee recommended creation of a new office of "public attorney" to handle cases in which public officials are charged with wrongdoing.

Sam J. Ervin Jr., the committee chairman who dominated the hearings that millions of persons saw on television last summer, said the committee would draw no conclusions about President Nixon's role in the scandal because of the House Judiciary Committee's impeachment inquiry.

"We just set forth the evidence," the North Carolina Democrat said at a news conference with three other committee members. "The evidence speaks for itself."

The committee concluded its work with a 2,217-page, three-volume study that will be released Sunday.

Most of the contents has already been disclosed to the press but the Senators in their final news conference gave some of their conclusions. With Mr. Ervin were Senators Lowell P. Weicker, Jr., Republican of Connecticut; Daniel Inouye, Democrat of Hawaii; and Joseph M. Montoya, Democrat of New Mexico.

They agreed that the investi-

gation provided no evidence to "refute" testimony by John W. Dean 3d, Mr. Nixon's former counsel and now his chief accuser.

Among findings and recommendations in the report cited by the Senators were the following:

¶That Congress step up its watchdog responsibilities over government agencies, particularly the executive branch.

¶That no evidence had been received that the Republican National Committee or the Democratic National Committee were guilty of any wrongdoing in the 1972 Presidential campaign.

¶That the purpose of the Watergate break-in was "to gain political intelligence."
