

# Trudeau to Forgo U.N.

In a display of candor, Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau of Canada announced yesterday that he had changed his mind and would not address the United Nations General Assembly during its current session, for the simple reason that he has nothing important enough to say. Canada's statement will be delivered instead by the new External Affairs Minister, Allan MacEachen, today.

Meanwhile, it was disclosed in Ottawa yesterday that Mr. Trudeau's wife, Margaret, was discharged from Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal on Sunday and is resting at home. Mrs. Trudeau spent 12 days in the hospital for psychiatric treatment for what she told newsmen was "severe emotional stress."

Demonstrators' yells of "Go home, butcher" greeted Shah Mohammed Riza Pahlavi of Iran yesterday as he was formally welcomed to Melbourne in front of City Hall. Some of the demonstrators scuffled with mounted police and four of them were arrested. The Melbourne demonstrations were similar to others that have plagued the Australian tour of the Shah and Empress Farah, who have been accompanied by personal bodyguards and almost unprecedented Government security precautions for their protection.

The demonstrators in Melbourne and in Sydney were thought to be from left-wing elements of the local Iranian community and the Palestinian-Australian Solidarity Committee. Some of the demonstrators have waved placards that read "Put the dirty Shah out" and "Stop the torture in Iran."

"I will do everything I can to help save the Lambs," said Jacqueline Onassis in a statement released by the Lambs in announcing that the former First Lady had become only the second woman ever admitted to the century-old theatrical club on West 44th Street.

Mrs. Onassis, who was promptly appointed a director of the
