Judge Frees Connally of All Charges

The final three criminal Watergate prosecutor in the charges against former Texas Connally case, said: Gov. John Conally were dismissed by a federal judge here yesterday at the request of the Watergate special prosecutor.

Chief U.S. District Court Judge George L. Hart Jr. took the action one day after a jury acquitted Connally of charges taling \$10,000 for getting a rise in government milk price supports.

Texas lawyer Jake Jacobsen testified during Connally's 11-day trial that he paid him the money on behalf of dairy producers in two installments in 1971, when Connally was Secretary of the Treasury in the first Nixon administration. Connally denied it.

The charges dismissed yesterday grew out of the same alleged circumstances. They were two counts of perjury in connection with Connally's connection with Connally's about the alleged payoff and testimony to a grand jury one count of conspiracy to obstruct justice by committing
