Re the 20mar74 letter to the NYTimes from Elliott Newcomb on the 25th amendment, I feel sure we've seen this referred to before many months ago, but not in such specific detail as far as Nixon's possible use of it is concerned.

It may account for some of his more confident statements, and certainly seems to shed considerable light on his choice of Ford.

It does appear to broaden and extend his options. We remain convinced that he never will stand still for a Senate trial. Even if he hangs on through a Judiciary Committee recommendation to impeach and a vote in the House. Hence, if he intends to use the 25th, ~~he~~ he more easily can say with conviction that he has no intention of resigning. He would prefer several alternatives to invoking the 25th, but it no doubt would be preferable to resigning in disgrace. Much will depend on timetables -- his own, and those he cannot control.
