Nigerians Attack American Embassy Over Angola Issue

Over Angola Issue NYTIMES JAN 1.2 LAGOS, Nigeria, Jan. (AP)—Nigerian demonstrators protesting United States policy toward Angola broke into the grounds of the United States Embassy today, plastered slo-gans on windows and threw stocks and stones at the build-ing. No injuries were reported. The attack was 'part of a protest demonstration in which some 2,000 Nigerian students, university teachers, workers and others carrying anti-Amer-ican placards marched four miles from Yaba on the Nige-rian mainland to the embassy, on Lagos Island. After attack-ing the building, they were persuaded to leave oy the police. There were similar attacks

There were similar attacks last week on the United States Consulate in the northern city of Kaduna and on the United States Information Service's office in the Western State capital of Ibadan. The demonstrations began after the Nigerian Government in a statement a week ago, re-jected an American suggestion that African leaders should in-sist on the withdrawal of So-viet and Cuban personnel-from Angola as a condition for the withdrawal of South African forces. The suggestion was made in a letter to African heads of state from President Ford. The letter was published here. Nigeria is a supporter of the

11 Nigerians Killed

LAGOS, Jan. 11 (Reuters)— The Nigerian Government said that 11 people were killed by a military attack on a Nigerian laborers' camp in Equatorial Guinea Thursday.

Guinea Thursday. A Government statement last night said that armed forces had attacked Nigerian nationals on the grounds of the Nigerian Embassy in Malabo. The statement said that the incident was "the worst to date in the unbroken chain of pro-vocation and humiliation meted out to Nigerians in Equatorial Guinea."
