STRIKES DISCLOSED BY LUANDA REGIME

Teachers and Others Halt Work in Central Area

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Jan. 12 (UPI)—Strikes were reported today in a part of central Angola held by na-tionalist forces that are sup-ported by the Soviet Union. The Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola said in a broadcast from Luanda, its capital, that walkouts by teachers, electricians, bakers, nurses, mechanics and civil ser-vants had almost paralyzed es-sential services in the town of Quibala and surrounding dis-tricts. The Luanda radio called on the strikers to return to work

the strikers to return to work immediately. It gave no reason for the strikes. The Quibala area is near An-gola's so-called southern front, wheer pro-Western nationalist forces last week called an unof-ficial temporary halt to the fighting to await the outcome of peace moves at the meeting of the Organization of African Unity in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. **Ready to Fight** Reports from the area said troops of the National Union for the Total Independence of Angola and the National Front for the Liberation of Angola, were ready to resume fighting if their leaders did not return from Ethiopia with a peace agreement.
