'The Greatest Article I Read in My Whole Life'

Richard Nixon's Vice President, Spiro Agnew, writing about Attica under his byline in The New York Times newspaper the other day, said: "To compare the loss of life by those who violate society's law with the loss of life of those whose job it is to uphold it—represents not simply an assault on human sensibility but an insult to reason."

Beautiful. I think it was the greatest article I read in my whole life. Governor Rockefeller seems to feel the way Agnew does, but Rockefeller has a family background for things like this. The Ludlow massacre and all that. Agnew's terrific article came from the heart. Because of it I finally was able to brush off the last shreds of the stupid ideas Sister Anna Gertrude outlitted us with in St. Benedict Joseph Labre school, Queens, New York City.

Sister Anna Gertrude used to get tears in her eyes reading from Luke. And, look at the way this Christ, in a life-and-death situation, worried about thieves. Finally, one of the thieves, I put him down in my mind as a top hoodlum like Bunny Johnson, said: "Lord, remember me when you come into your Kingdom."

And Jesus Christ, in what I was taught was the last line He said on earth, turned to this thief, this Bunny Johnson, and said: "This day you will be with me in paradise."

How do you like it? How do you like what some backward nun put into my head? Here's a Guy has nails in Him and He is washing His time giving amnesty to a thief, and they had me believing for a long time, Sister Anna Gertrude and the other nuns in St. Benedict Joseph Labre School, Queens, New York City, that this Jesus Christ was great because
