Vice President to Testify Before Jury Tomorrow NYTimes

Vice President Rockefeller has agreed to testify tomorrow before oefore a grand jury investigating the prison uprising at Attica four years ago.

"They asked i: he would help out and cooperate, and he said yes," John Milliken, Mr. Rocke-feller's deputy press secretary, said yesterday in Washington. he Vice President, who was

Governor of New York at the time of the prison uprising, will appear before the grand jury tomorrow afternoon in Warsaw, a village near the Attica Correctional Facility.

That grand jury, the second to look into the prison revoltwas established last year to investigate the possibility of crimes by law enforcement officers while and after they regained control of te maxinum-security prison.

39 Killed in Assault

Duri.g the retaking of the prison on Sept. 13, 1971, 39 inmates and hostages were killed and 80 were wounded by gunfire from state troopers and correction officers. So far, 62 inmates have been indicted. No law enforcement officers have been indicted.

The decision to retake the prison was authorized by Mr. Rockefeller, who was criticized by the New York State Spccial Commission on Attica, known as the McKay Commission, after its chairman, Robert Mc-Kay, for not going to the pri-

Mr. Rockefeller has testified several times on his role in the retaking of the prison. Most recently, on Aug. 8, he testified for five hours before Bernard S. Meyer, who heads an investi-gation into charges of possible begins at 10 this morning at misconduct by the Attica prose-the New York County Lawyers

After he was nominated for Vice President, Mr. Rockefeller Ive on WNET-TV, Channel 13, told a Senate committee that he would "always regret" the WNYC-AM.

His grand jury appearance will come a day after he is scheduled to testify here before the Moreland Act Commission investigating nursing homes in New York.

Mr. Rockefeller is expected to answer questions about the use of his office while he was Governor on behalf of Bernard Bergman, the nursfng-home enAssociation, 14 Vesey Street.
