A special grand jury investigating the 1971 Attica prison rebellion indicted a state trooper yesterday for his role in quelling the inmate revolt that claimed 43 lives.

Trooper Gregory Wildridge is the first law enforcement officer to be indicted in the four-year-old investigation of the uprising.

Wildridge was indicted for, first-class reckless endangerment, a felony which carries a prison term of up to seven years.

New York's penal code describes "reckless endangerment" as "evincing a depraved indifference to human life."

A special county grand jury indicted 62 inmates accused of various crimes during the fiveday revolt.

Wildridge acknowledged his identity but otherwise remained silent when arraigned before Judge Carman Ball.

Following the brief arraignment, Patrick Carroll, the State Police Benevolent Association's president, said in a statement:

"This is a class A example of politically orien ted prosecutors wearing down a grand jury to get an unwarranted indictment.

"It is clean from the facts that the prosecutors have hounded the grand jury for 2½ years simply to obtain an indictment against a New York state trooper. I believe this is a travesty of justice to indict a trooper who was risking his life to quell a prison riot."
