PROSECUTORS SET IN BERRIGAN CASE

**A 4-Man Team Is Chosen—
All Are Roman Catholics**

WASHINGTON, March 11 (UPI)—The Justice Department completed its prosecuting team in the Berrigan conspiracy trial today by appointing three more Roman Catholic trial lawyers to present the Government's case against the Catholic anti-war protesters.

"The fact all are Catholic came to light only after they were selected," said Robert C. Mardian, Assistant Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department's Internal Security Division. "We wanted to form a staff of top-notch lawyers in the division."

Joining William S. Lynch, who will be the chief prosecutor, will be:

Kevin T. Maroney, 47 years old, Deputy Assistant Attorney General in Mr. Mardian's division.

William M. Connelly, 31, an Assistant United States Attorney at Toledo, Ohio.

Daniel J. McAuliffe, 25, a special assistant to Mr. Mardian who formerly worked for him in the Office of the General Counsel of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Volunteered for Job

Mr. Lynch said that Mr. Connelly had volunteered for the assignment during a recent Justice Department conference on organized crime, and that Mr. Lynch was unaware either of his religion or his reasons for being interested in the case.

The team has already begun preparations for the trial of six pacifists led by the Rev. Philip F. Berrigan, a Josephite priest, who are charged with conspiring to blow up heating system tunnels in Washington last month and to kidnap Henry A. Kissinger, national security affairs adviser to President Nixon.

The other defendants include two other Catholic priests, a nun, a former priest and a Pakistani student in Chicago. All were indicted on Jan. 12 by a Federal grand jury in Harrisburg, Pa., where the trial will be held.

Mother of 3 Cited

HARRISBURG, Pa., March 10 (AP)—Mrs. Pat Chanel was held in contempt of court today for refusing to tell a Federal grand jury what she knows about an alleged plot to kidnap a Presidential adviser and blow up heating tunnels in Washington.

Mrs. Chanel, a 41-year-old mother of three, is the sister of Joe M. Joynt of Silver Spring, Md., who works for the General Services Administration and reportedly has access to the heating tunnels.

Mrs. Chanel was the second person cited by Judge R. Dixon Herman of Federal District Court after he granted immunity from prosecution. She was not jailed, however, pending an appeal in a similar case.
