5 ANTIWAR INMATES PROTEST AT DANBURY

PKUIESI AI DAIVDUM Special to The New York Times DANBURY, Conn., Aug. 6— Five antiwar inmates of the Federal Correctional Institution here began a hunger strike and work stoppage today after is-suing a set of demands and urg-ing their fellow prisoners to join in their strike. Among the demands were the release of the Rev. Daniel Berrigan and an early review of the parole application of his brother, Philip, who are serv-ing terms at Danbury for de-stroying draft board records. Reform of Federal parole pro-cedures was also demanded, as well as an end to tiger-cage prison cells in South Vietnam. Paul O'Dwyer, the New York lawyer who represents the Ber-rigans, visited the prison today and reported that another of his clients there. Theodore Glick, had informed him that he, John Bach, Edward Gersh, Thomas Hosmer and David Malamet had begun the fast. Mr. O'Dwyer said he had been told that the five were placed in solitary confinement after distributing leaflets to fel-low inmates asking that they join the fast and work stop-page.
