(UPI) — Defense attorneys in the Berrigan conspiracy case asked today that the trial be moved to New York City because the Government contends it has evidence placing part of the alleged conspiracy there.

As an alternative, the attorneys said in their petition to Judge R. Dixon Herman, those defendants implicated by the evidence should be tried in New York and the others in Pennsylvania.

The evidence was presumed to be a letter from sister Elizabeth McAlister to the Rev. Phillips F. Berrigan.
