HARRISBURG, Pa., March The conspiracy case of the Rev. Philip F. Berrigan and six other antiwar activists went to

other antiwar activists went to the jury this afternoon after a charge by Federal District Judge R. Dixon Herman that was denounced by defense attorneys as "a summation for conviction."

Judge Herman's two-hour charge may have caused "irreparable prejudice" in the minds of the jurors, the defense counsel said. The five attorneys advanced to the bench after Judge Herman had sent the nine women and three men out to deliberate. They asked him to deliberate.
