

LONDON, Jan. 11 (AP)—The London Times published an article today by a self-identified former CIA agent, who suggested that in the age of the computer readout itican fairly be said that the agency spies on as many as 100 million Americans.

Miles Copeland, who lives in London, wrote that "now there is a fuss about a mere 10,000 names." But he said through computers and exchanges with other agencies, the CIA has access to virtually all U.S. files on private
