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CIA Probers Meet With Colson

Investigators for the Rockefeller commission met privately with former White House special counsel Charles W. Colson yesterday to probe allegations he has made concerning CIA domestic operations.

Neither Colson nor his attorney, Kenneth L. Adams, was available for comment and a spokesman for the commission refused to acknowledge that the meeting had taken place.

However, two administration officials confirmed that Colson had met with "several members of the staff for a couple of hours."

Colson, who was released from prison less than two weeks ago after serving seven months of a one-to-three-year term for obstruction of justice, has made a number of accusations concerning the CIA.

In a recent television interview, Colson said it was inconceivable to him that the agency would not have been aware of plans for break-ins at both Democratic headquarters in the Watergate complex and the offices of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

Earlier, Colson had told Senators Lowell P. Weicker (Rep.-Conn.) and Howard H. Baker Jr. (Rep.-Tenn.) that convicted Watergate conspirator E. Howard Hunt forwarded sealed packages to then-CIA director Richard M. Helms up until a month before the June 1972 Watergate break-in.
