WASHINGTON, March 7-The Rockefeller commission on the Central Intelligence Agency, is looking into allegations that the C.I.A. was somehow involved in the assassination of President Kennedy in 1963, according to informed sources close to its investigation. close to its investigation.

One focus of the commission's inquiry, the sources said, is the recent assertion of a group headed by Dick Gregory, the comedian and civil rights activist, that E. Mr. Hunt also reportedly degained a report, which has lately gained some currency among amateur assassination investigators, that he met Oswald in Mexico City in 1963 while serving as chief of the C.I.A. station

The Warren Commission in quiry established that Oswald visited Mexico City on Sept. 27, 1963, less than two months before the Kennedy assassination, when he requested permission to visit Cuba from the Cactro Government's embassy there.
