The three important measures were: 1) to keep the CIA budget secret (Amendment to H.R. 9861), 2) to keep the House Committee Report on Intelligence Agency Activities secret (H.R. 982), and 3) to investigate the publication of the House Committee Report on Intelligence Agency Activities (Daniel Schorr, H.R. 1042). They are abbreviated below as 1) CIA Budget, 2) Committee Report, and 3) Investigation.

A minus means that the congressperson voted to keep the CIA budget secret, to keep the committee report secret, and to investigate the publication of the report. A minus representative voted against allowing the people access to government information.

A plus congressperson voted to support publication and noninvestigation, votes which the ACLU applauds. The number who deserve applause unfortunately are not yet enough. Check to see if your congressperson represents your views on these issues.

The other symbols in the chart are as follows: a "(" around a "-" or "+" means that the congressperson did not vote but did indicate his or her position on the measure by a House voting technique called "pairing;" an "N" means that the representative did not vote; "NOR" means the person was not on the role at the time of the vote; and a "P" means the congressperson answered "Present."

## Black Jack must pay for bias

### Developers to get \$450,000 damages

**Black Jack, Mo.**  
An ACLU lawsuit against the small city of Black Jack has ended in a victory for nondiscriminatory housing.

Black Jack, which in 1970 unconstitutionally banned a proposed apartment development, has agreed to pay \$450,000 in damages to backers of the development.

"This is the first time in the country that a city has been ordered to pay damages to a developer because of racial discrimination in housing," said ACLU cooperating attorney Lawrence G. Sager, who handled the case together with Arthur Eisenberg, staff counsel of the New York CLU. "It should act as a deterrent to other municipalities."

The case began in 1970 when the Park View Heights Corp., assisted by a coalition of churches, received federal funding for a 214-unit housing development to be built on 12 acres in Black Jack. The complex for moderate income tenants would be racially integrated.

Shortly afterwards Black Jack, a part of St. Louis County, incorporated as a separate city and passed a zoning ordinance barring multi-family dwellings. The ordinance, challenged by the Justice Department, was found to be racially discriminatory by a court of appeals in 1974.

ACLU's lawsuit sought \$1.9 million in damages for increased construction costs caused by Black Jack's opposition. If the community meets the terms of the \$450,000 settlement, it will gain ownership of the 12 acres on which the development was to have been built.

## Somers drops shock therapy for prisoners

The Connecticut State Department of Corrections has dropped the use of its behavior modification program for convicted "child molesters" at Somers State Prison.

The behavior modification program included administering painful electric shocks to the groin area of prisoners while showing them slides of nude children.

State officials recently agreed to a stipulation settling the case against the Somers program. The ACLU's National Prison Project and the Connecticut CLU handled the case on behalf of three prisoners who refused to participate in the program. The three were denied parole for refusing.

The stipulation states that corrections officials do not intend to use aversive conditioning again. If they change their minds, they are required to submit their plans to the ACLU and the court for examination.

As required by the stipulation, the three prisoners who brought the lawsuit were recently given parole hearings. All three were granted parole.

## Manson film ban appealed

**San Francisco, Calif.**

The 26-county ban on the showing of the film *Manson*, ordered last October by U.S. District Court Judge Thomas MacBride in the trial of Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, has been appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Charles Marson, legal director of the ACLU of Northern California, petitioned the Court to invalidate the gag order because it interfered with the right of the public to see and hear the film, and was not necessary to protect Fromme's right to a fair trial.

Though the gag order expired after the jury was sequestered, the Northern California affiliate and the national ACLU are asking the Court to review its legality anyway since it addresses "important issues of free press and fair trial that are unique and of the utmost public importance."

"There are ample means available to the courts to ensure that an impartial jury is seated without denying two million people in 26 counties the right to see the movie," Marson said.

The Manson film case is the second

gag order case taken to the Supreme Court in recent months. The Court has already decided to review the Nebraska Press Association case, in which the issue is whether gag orders on press reporting criminal proceedings are unconstitutional. Marson and ACLU staff counsel Joel Gora prepared the ACLU's amicus brief in the Nebraska case.

Both cases are similar in that they involve gag orders placed directly on the media. Usually, gag orders are directed only at the parties in a case or officers of the court. Gag orders against third parties not involved in the case have never been upheld.
