ARRESTS TOTAL 100 IN SAIGON SPY CASE

High Government Officials Among Those Accused of 'Liaison With Enemy'

SAIGON, South Vietnam, Aug. -Arrests now total about 100 in the month-old crackdown on what is described as an enemy spy ring that penetrated deep into the South Vietnamese Government, police sources said today.

The seizures have doubled in the last two weeks, netting not only high Government officials but also numerous low-level functionaries. Never before in the war have so many people been charged with spying.

Few details about the operations of the accused have been made public. The information void has been filled with rumors and theories that rival those generated by the Green Beret case. Some of the rumors and theories vaguely connect the Government crackdown with the arrest of the eight Special Forces soldiers, who face possible courts-martial in the reported slaying of a Vietnamese intelligence agent.

'Liaison' With Foe Charged

All of the accused have been charged with "liaison with the enemy" and are being held at the headquarters of the national police. South Vietnamese law does not provide for bail during

The cases may not come to trial for weeks and investigators are still hard at work.

The police indicated initially that a news conference would be held to explain how the alleged agents worked and how they were exposed. But as more and more arrests have been made and as the affair has become more and more sensitive, the prospect of any im-
