ment from July 19 until Aug. 18 before being shifted to con-finement in a barracks. The eight men are still in detention while the Army decides whether

to try them. While in solitary confinement, Captain Williams wrote, there was only one opening in his sealed room. The roof was made of tin and the tempera-ture correct ture soared.
