

**BERET CASE CAPTAIN
DISCHARGED BY ARMY**

FORT MONMOUTH, N. J., Oct. 14 (AP)—Capt. Robert F. Marasco, the Special Forces officer who was accused by the Army of killing a South Vietnamese double agent, was processed out of the Army Tuesday.

Captain Marasco, who was one of the eight Green Berets involved in the case, received an honorable discharge at his request and will retain a Reserve commission, an Army spokesman said.

The captain, a 27-year-old Bloomfield, N. J., native, said he had "no idea" what he was going to do. "I'm going to look for a job."

The Army dropped murder and conspiracy charges against the men after the Central Intelligence Agency, which was indirectly involved, refused to allow its agents to testify.

The victim of the slaying was supposedly a South Vietnamese intelligence agent who, it was said, was discovered to have been working with the North Vietnamese.

Captain Marasco was accused of being the "trigger man" in the slaying.
