DELAY IS FORESEEN ON PUEBLO'S CREW

Special to The New York Times SEOUL, South Korea, Feb. 23 —The South Korean intelli-gence authorities estimate that North Korea will hold the 82 crowmen of the captured Amer-ican intelligence ship Pueblo for two months more and possibly longer in order to extract as much information as possible. The estimate is based on ex-pert knowledge of interrogation techniques and on political de-velopments in Pyongyang, the North Korean capital, since the vessel was captured by North Korean patrol craft on Jan. 23. From their own experience with Communist prisoners and defectors from the North, the South Koreans calculate that it takes up to six months of con-tinual interrogation before the possibility of getting more in-formation from a prisoner is ex-hausted. The large number of captives,

formation from a prisoner is ex-hausted. The large number of captives, including naval officers, scien-tists and technicians with high-ly specialized skills, indicates the extent of the interrogation task, the authorities explained.
