PANEL WILL STUDY C.I.A. ACADEMIC TIES

Robert A. Dahl, president of
the American Political Science Association, said Wednesday night that he had appointed a panel of four political science specialists to investigate the extent of penetration of the academic community by the Central

demic community by the Central Intelligence Agency.

Declaring that he was "sickened and alarmed" by news reports that the agency had financed academic areas, Mr. Dahl said he had appointed R. Taylor Cole, provost of Duke University; Gabriel Almond, of Stanford University; C. Herman Pritchett, of the University of California, Santa Barbara; and Daivd B. Truman, Dean of Columbia College, Columbia University, to make the inquiry.

He said the panel would begin its work "within the next two months." Its findings, he said, will be submitted to the association.

"The C.I.A," said Mr. Dahl, "these procedured in the sickers of the content of the said, with the content of the said."

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"The C.I.A," said Mr. Dahl,
"has penetrated academic and
cultural circles through foundations and psuedo-foundations
to which they channeled funds.
There are bound to be evil effects from such practices."

Even if no improper influence
is proved, he added, the position
of United States scholars, their
relations with foreign coleagues
and their chances for research
may be found to have "suffered
grievously."

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
