Special to The New York Times POUGHKEEPSIE, N.Y., Feb. 23—Several Vassar College stu-dents tried today without suc-cess to have questions answered about the Central Intelligence Agency's use of information and its methods of gathering it. Max Wiecks, a recruiter from the agency's personnel office, refused during a meeting on campus to answer any questions i that did not pertain to employ-ment opportunities. This was his 10th annual recruiting visit here, and he said that the 70 n students present represented the best turnout ever. Students had been told of Mr. Wiecks's visit in a letter signed

best turnout ever. Students had been told of Mr. Wiecks's visit in a letter signed by 22 faculty members and pub-lished in The Miscellany News, the weekly campus newspaper, on Feb. 15. The letter said the agency was involved in research proj-ects at numerous universities and that American scholars abroad were thus viewed with suspicion. It urged students who planned academic careers "to consider how such careers may be affected by prior employ-ment with the C.I.A." The Vassar chapter of the Students for a Democratic So-ciety publicized the recruiting meetings in a pamphlet circu-lated this morning in dormi-tories and in the campus post office. The pamphlet urged the students to attend the meeting to ask questions concerning agency activities.

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
