TALKS WITH CUBAN REPORTED IN CHILE

Allende's New Government Seeks to Establish Ties

Santiago, Chile, Nov. 10 - The six-day-old Government of President Salvador Allende Gossens has begun negotiations to re-establish Chile's diplomatic relations with Cuba, well-informed sources said today.

The quick renewal of Chile's relations with Cuba, severed in 1904 [date illegible] under the terms of a resolution adopted by the Organization of American States, would underline President Allende's announced intention to remove his country from its recent alignment with United States policy in Latin America.

Chile would become the first member of the Organization of American States to reverse adherence to the original resolution, adopted at the urging of the United States.

Mexico, alone of the members of the O.A.S., refused to obey the resolution that made the severing of diplomatic, commercial and transportation ties with Cuba mandatory for member states.

.... It is understood that [President Allende] told President
Nixon's envoy to his inauguration that he also wanted to continue normal
relations with the United States.

He has also indicated Chile will probably establish diplomatic relations with Communist China, North Korea, North Vietnam and East Germany.

Aside from Cuba's position in his foreign policy considerations, Dr. Allende ... has long made public his personal sympathies with Cuba and his friendship with Premier Castro.
