# Chile Seizes a U.S. Professor in Hunt for Leftists

SANTIAGO, Chile, Sept. 24—The military authorities made dozens of new arrests in downtown Santiago today as the house-to-house search for supporters of the late President Salvador Allende Gossens continued.

An American professor, James Gordon Ritter, is among those detained. He was taken from his home to the Ministry of Defense yesterday and his whereabouts now is unknown.

The military authorities announced today they were looking for 36 "extremist leaders," but they have made widespread arrests among foreigners known to be sympathetic to President Allende's Marxist regime.

Four other Americans are un-

accounted for in the widespread arrests that began two weeks ago with the overthrow of President Allende.

"We're checking everywhere for them — prisons, hospitals and other government buildings where they're holding prisoners — but we have found no trace of them so far," Frank Tonini, press attaché at the United States Embassy, said afternoon.

The missing four are the Rev. Charles Paul Welsh of the Congregation of the Holy Cross, Charles Edmund Horman, a New York film-maker, Carol Nezzo, a Methodist worker, and a Julius Wool.

Two American members of the Maryknoll mission, Francis Flynn, a seminarian, and the Rev. Joseph Doherty, are still

among the 7,000 Chileans and foreigners held prisoner in the National Stadium here. Their release had been promised last Friday.

Two other Americans were reported today to have been detained Saturday: Charles Fisk, who was taken with other prisoners to the School for Aviation, and Juan José Nolasco, a nationalized American from the Dominican Republic, who was said to have been taken to the stadium.

The authorities announced today that a score of people, including a number of foreigners said to possess arms, were arrested yesterday in the middle-class San Borja district.

The military was reported to have seized not only Marxist

literature but sociological literature in general and newspapers and magazines.

"We respect ideas and there has been no Government order to burn Marxist books," a Government spokesman said, but he added that instructions had been given to seize literature that might be used as codes.

There is panic in the foreign community here, particularly among Latin Americans here under the Allende regime as political exiles.

The military authorities have had a number of declarations charging that the foreign leftists had come here "to kill Chileans." The foreigners are being held responsible for training Chilean left-wing guerrillas and spreading Marxism.

## Widow of Allende Leaves Mexico for Visit in Cuba

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 24 (Reuters)—The widow of the former Chilean President, Salvador Allende Gossens, flew to Cuba today for a visit. She was accompanied by the Cuban Ambassador to Mexico, Fernando López Muino.

A family spokesman said that Mrs. Allende would visit her daughter, Beatriz, who is the wife of a Cuban diplomat and left Santiago shortly after the military coup that deposed her father. She is expecting a baby.

Mrs. Allende is expected to return to Mexico in about a week.
