

Chile Claims Favor Of West's Bankers

SANTIAGO, Oct. 7—Central Bank President Gen. Eduardo Cano said at a press conference today that the World Bank and international financial circles were well-disposed to the new military government in Chile.

Gen. Cano, who recently returned from the International Monetary Fund meeting in Nairobi, said that Chile would respect all its financial obligations "even though the country is loaded with debts."

He reported: "Our debts amount to \$4 billion, our expenditures to \$1.4 billion, and our resources to only \$1 billion. That is the financial situation of Chile."

Military authorities reported that eight persons were killed in two separate clashes with government forces on Friday.

A government spokesman announced yesterday that the death toll since the Sept. 11

coup which overthrew the leftist government of the late President Salvador Allende was 513. Of the dead, 476 were civilians and 37 were members of the armed forces and police he said. Unofficial calculations have put the number of deaths in the thousands.

The National Committee to Aid refugees, set up by the four-man military junta last week, announced the opening of 33 offices in 12 cities as havens for exiles from other countries who sought refuge here under the Allende government.

Hans Janitschek, secretary general of the Socialist International, sent a telegram to U.N. Secretary General Kurt Waldheim saying that Chile's new military government had suppressed all liberties and set up a propaganda machine producing "defamatory and naive" lies.
