

Rocky Supplies His Tax Returns

Nelson A. Rockefeller's federal income tax returns for the last seven years have been turned over to the congressional committees considering his nomination as vice president.

The former New York governor supplied copies of his returns to the Senate Rules and Administration Committee and the House Judiciary Committee.

Arrangements have been made for the staff of the Joint Committee on Internal Revenue Taxation to analyze the returns and submit a summary report of its findings to the Senate and House committees.

Rockefeller later is to submit a financial statement listing assets and liabilities; but committee aides said they had no information on how soon this will be ready.

The Library of Congress already has begun supplying data, going back to 1927, on Rockefeller. This includes articles about him in newspapers and magazines.

speeches he has made, and similar material.

And in addition to a full FBI investigation, the General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress, is checking on the financing of Rockefeller's campaigns for public office.

Special prosecutor Leon Jaworski and Senator Sam J. Ervin Jr. (Dem-N.C.), chairman of the Senate Watergate committee, also have been asked to report if they uncovered any information bearing on Rockefeller's fitness for vice president.

As was the case when President Ford was nominated for vice president last October, the Senate and House committees have agreed to exchange information.

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
