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Harvard Professor May Be Named Aide To Ford's Counsel

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WASHINGTON, Sept. 11— Phillip Areeda, a Harvard law professor and specialist in antitrust matters, will be named tomorrow as an assistant to Philip W. Buchen, the White House counsel, according to sources in the academic community.

Neither White House press spokesmen nor Mr. Areeda would confirm the appointment, but the professor said in a telephone interview, "I'll be glad to talk about it tomorrow."

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Harvard friends of Mr. Aree-da said he was being brought into the White House to pro-vide more legal muscle for President Ford's increasingly complicated affairs. Mr. Areeda, who is 44 years old, served as executive direc-tor of the Cabinet task force on oil import control in 1969. He also served as assistant spe-cial counsel to President Eisen-hower between 1956 and 1961. Urged Nixon's Re-election During the 1972 Presidential election, Mr. Areeda was among a group of 79 academi-cians who urged the re-election

of President Nixon in a series of newspaper advertisements. As the Watergate scandal started to unfold a year later, however, Mr. Areeda said he was less than happy that he had supported Mr. Nixon. In another White House staff change, Maj. Gen. John M. Dunn, former military aide to Vice Presidents Ford and Ag-new, was appointed deputy ex-ecutive director of the Council on International Economic Pol-icy. General Dunn served in icy.
