Sen. Buckley Asks A National Debate On Ties With Cuba

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 —
Senator James L. Buckley, Conservative-Republican of New
York, called today for a national debate before the United
States improves relations with
Cuba.

"Before we plunge ahead and
make concessions to Cuba, we should have a national debate
to highlight the issue," Mr.
Buckley said in an interview.
"We seem to be caught on a
drift moving us uncritically toward a relaxation of sanctions
against the Castro regime."

"I have been concerned that
practically no one has called
attention to serious hemisphere
security problems posed by the
special relations between the
Soviet Union and Cuba," he
said.

Mr. Buckley said that any United States concessions to Cuba should be conditional upon the Cuban Government's termination of "a special relationship with the Soviet Union."

He cited what he called "mounting evidence of Soviet participation in political terrorism in Latin America." He said that establishment of Soviet submarine-tender basing facilities on Cuba would enable the Soviet Union to vastly expand its nuclear-submarine presence in the western Atlantic on short notice.
