

More Rockefeller Hearings Urged

Senator James B. Allen (Dem - Ala.) said yesterday that recipients of gifts and major political contributions from vice presidential nominee Nelson A. Rockefeller should be called to testify before the Senate Rules Committee.

Allen, a committee member, also said that Rockefeller's brother Laurance, former Supreme Court Justice Arthur Goldberg, and others questioning about a derogatory

book written about Goldberg.

The book, by Victor Lasky, was written in 1970 when Goldberg was Nelson Rockefeller's Democratic opponent for governor of New York. Laurance Rockefeller put up \$60,000 to finance its publication.

Allen called for reopening the hearings on Rockefeller's nomination after the committee chairman was quoted by an aide as saying the former New York gover-

nor probably would be recalled.

Allen said that Lasky and the officers of Arlington House, publishers of the book on Goldberg, should be among the witnesses.

He said that "an exhaustive investigation must be made and all leads pursued" if the committee is to fulfill its responsibility to the Senate and the people in making a recommendation on whether Rockefeller should

be confirmed.

His nomination by President Ford is subject to approval by majority vote in both the Senate and the House.
