Dallas, Tex., Feb. 24 (AP) - Dist Atty Henry Wade said today he has believed all along that "someone might have encouraged or aided" - ee Harvey Uswald in killing President John F. Kennedy.

Wade said he was told as much to the Warren Commission and reiterated he has "absolutely no evidence" to refute the commission's finding that the weight of evidence showed Oswald acted alone.

Wake said he knew nothing of New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's current investigation into the assassination. Garrison has said he has solved the assassination and will make arrests.

"It seemed a little complicated for Oswald to figure out alone, and he did have a let of Castro literature on him. He had to plan this pretty well, learn the route and learn to be in one certain place," Wade said of the assassination.

Wake said he was supposed to question swald Nov. 24, the Sunday Jack Ruby gunned down Oswald.

Wade said he shifted his attention to the Ruby trial after Uswald was killed and left the c ntinuing investigation of the assassination kenthe up to the FBI, Secret Service and otherofficials.
