

Denies Perjury

Ex-Oswald

Lawyer Pleads

NEW ORLEANS — (UPI) — Attorney Dean Andrews Jr., who once represented Lee Harvey Oswald, pleaded innocent today to a perjury indictment growing out of a Grand Jury investigation of an alleged conspiracy to assassinate President Kennedy.

suburban Jefferson Parish, appearing without the dark glasses he refers to as his trade mark, requested and was granted a jury trial.

Judge Frank J. Shea gave defense attorneys until April 10 to file motions.

The indictment charged Andrews with "willfully and unlawfully" giving falsehoods to the Grand Jury March 16.

The indictment said the Grand Jury at the time was considering matters "relative to a conspiracy to murder John F. Kennedy, President of the United States."

• The Grand Jury resumed its investigation but could not locate lounge owner Gordon Novell, who was reported to have sold his business last Sunday and left no forwarding address.

• Dist. Judge Malcolm O'Hara granted businessman Clay L. Shaw permission to leave the jurisdiction of the court today through Sunday to visit the Mississippi gulf coast. Shaw has been accused in the assassination conspiracy.

Novell's attorney, Steve Plotkin said he would see to it that his client appeared.

Novell showed up for the Grand Jury last Thursday but was never called. He said

at that time that he apparently was wanted to provide some information about Sergio Acacha Smith, a Cuban exile leader who formerly lived in New Orleans and now lives in Dallas.
